... it is one of those things that we know to be true, but don't realise until we lose the capacity to do what we normally do, and then we have a light bulb moment and wake up to what has been there all along.


And so it is that the whole living earth is greater than the sum of its parts.

To achieve a goal it can be useful to break it down into its constituent parts or manageable chunks, from which we can then assemble the finished product/whole.

We need materials/ingredients, tools/technology, method/know-how, skills, energy/effort, motivation/willingness, vision/picture of the completed work (of art?) and purpose.

Combined, we have a story—the story of a cake or a meal or a car or a trip or house or a garden or a school or club or a business or a family or society or an earth—a story that we want to be a part of.

And this story is important when we are trying to explain why things are not going so well. because it helps to find the weak points, to identify where we need to put some effort, to strengthen the links in the



chain.

It is how we live—by telling stories, reading or watching other peoples stories.

For centuries we have lived by the truths contained within the stories. They are written on our faces, in our actions, by how we invest our time or spend our money.

We are constantly exchanging our stories with those around us—on social media, across the dining table, at places of work and play and even to ourselves (as self talk).

Take this opportunity to write a story to yourself or someone you care deeply about, explaining what kind of world you would really like to live in. See how close you can get it to being what Thomas Berry calls: The Dream of the Earth.



Any suggestions for practical 'how to' guides?

Sort of. There is no single all encompassing how to guide when it comes to living in harmony with the earth. This book goes some way to helping us get our heads around what is required. It is a case of many small steps that when combined contains an authentic version of living in-communion with the non-human members of the earth community.





How can I start a conversation with family and friends who don't want to talk about the problems we face? They think it's silly talking about these things


